Settle Community Library and The Cooperative/Crowdfunding support

Settle Community Library is facing a difficult financial problem at the moment. The energy costs for the library have quadrupled over the last few months while our income has stayed static. From April these energy costs are likely to rise even higher.

Since the library opened, our income has come from any charges for Book clubs, ordering books, hire of the library for events, fines for late return of books and grants found by the Management Committee.

These grants have always been for capital expenditure (new furniture, blinds, projectors etc).

The Cooperative/Crowdfunding is offering help towards energy costs to help maintain the Warm Places on offer to the public. Our application for this financial support was successful and our Crowdfunding site went live recently giving the public the opportunity of supporting the library.


The library now really needs your help, and every penny donated by YOU will be matched by the Cooperative society, so every £10 becomes £20. We need to work together to conserve this wonderful local amenity.

Would you like to become a friend of Settle Community Library?

One of our Library Trustees, Bob Young, has been asked to review the workings of the Friends of Settle Library scheme to see (a) whether it meets the expectations of current Friends and (b) whether it could be improved with a view to attracting more Friends.

Under present arrangements, Friends subscribe £10 per annum to the library, or more if they so wish. We currently have just over 100 Friends, who thus – generously – contribute roughly £1,000 per annum to library funds. Revenue from Friends is allocated by the Trustees to a variety of functions that the library fulfils, and the allocation changes from year to year. To give an example, £1,000 of contributions will fund several speaker events at the library which aim to stimulate community interest in and usage of the library. In almost all its activities the library's costs continue to rise sharply, so the generosity of Friends matters a great deal and is much appreciated.
